Fun Facts on Recycling

The paper industry hopes to recover 60% of the paper Americans consume by the year 2012.

In 2008 the amount of paper recovered for recycling averaged 340 pounds for each man, woman, and child in the United States.

In 2008 a record-high 57.4% of the paper consumed in the U.S. was recovered for recycling.

Want to recycle a billion paper bags? Easy! The job could be done if each American family added just one paper bag to their recycling each week for 13 weeks.

The amount of paper recovered for recycling in the U.S. in 2007 was enough to fill 130 Empire State buildings.

Every ton of paper recovered for recycling saves 3.3 cubic yards of landfill space.

Newspapers are recycled into other products such as cereal boxes, egg cartons, pencil barrels, grocery bags, tissue paper, and cellulose insulation materials.

We hear about recycling every day - in discussions with friends and family members, on the television, on the internet, and in magazines. Chances are, you pass dozens of recycling bins as you go about your daily routine. So, what's the big deal? How does it happen? Can tossing your used paper in a recycling bin really make a difference? The answer is yes. Recycling paper not only reclaims a valuable commodity, it also helps communities by keeping paper out of landfills, thereby avoiding methane gas emissions. The paper that we recover for recycling helps to improve the environment and produce new paper products that we use in our everyday lives.
